



A REAL ESTATE AGENT OR LAWYER

TO BUY A HOUSE?

If you're selling a house in California, then it's critical that you have a licensed real estate agent list your property on the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) so that the seller obtains the best marketing exposure; but, if you're buying a house, you might be surprised to learn that using a lawyer is often a better alternative to the normal agency relationship.

■ LAWYERS OWE THEIR CLIENTS HIGHER DUTIES THAN AGENTS

Real estate agents owe their clients typical fiduciary duties of good faith, fair dealing and full disclosure, but these duties are fairly limited. For example, agents in California can (and often do) represent both the buyer and seller of a home, or may even have a personal interest in the transaction, as long as the proper disclosures are made. Lawyers, on the other hand, are ethically bound to avoid conflicts of interest by representing only the interests of one party, and a lawyer may not have a personal interest in the transaction. Lawyers owe their clients the highest duties of loyalty and fidelity.

■ AGENTS CANNOT GIVE LEGAL ADVICE

Real estate agents are not authorized to practice law. This means that they can help negotiate and fill-in blanks on a form selected by the parties or act as a scrivener in recording the parties' agreement, but that's about it. Lawyers, on the other hand, are specifically trained and authorized to practice law without limitation. Moreover, lawyers owe their clients a duty of competency, including a duty of diligence that far exceeds the duties of a real estate agent. This means that lawyers are supposed to think about and anticipate potential problems in the transaction that agents often overlook (often resulting in expensive litigation), and lawyers must advise their clients accordingly.

■ AGENTS ARE PAID ONLY IF THE SALE IS COMPLETED

This may sound like a benefit to a homebuyer, but the fact that a real estate agent only earns a commission if the deal closes creates inherent conflict and bias in the agency relationship. The agent is obviously incentivized to make sure the transaction is completed so they can get paid, even if the closing may not be in the buyer's best interests. This conflict is even more pronounced when the agent represents both the buyer and seller in the transaction, since a buyer's interests are in direct conflict with the seller's interests—the buyer wants the lowest possible price while the seller wants the highest possible price. Recognizing this inherent conflict, some states actually prohibit such dual agency. Lawyers, on the other hand, typically charge an hourly or flat fee, such that they are unaffected by the transaction itself.



As the fans know, the glitter and glamour of the former Bob Hope Classic is all but gone.





fter Humana Corporation decided it was time to bow out of the title sponsorship role of the Coachella Valley's PGA Tour stop, and before CareerBuilder came onboard to carry that mantle, there was a time when, once again, the tournament was without a sponsor.

What it wasn't without, however, was the support of the Clinton Foundation, which became involved along with Humana in 2012. The foundation then reiterated its commitment to the tournament even after Humana decided to end its partnership. It will continue to partner with new title sponsor,

vow to continue the tournament's dedication to heath and wellness.

John Foster, president of Desert Classic Charities, says the foundation's "Health Matters" conference was independently tied into the tournament with a long-term agreement, and was well received within the valley. In essence, the existing agreement between the foundation and the tournament stayed in place despite Humana's departure. And the foundation's work will continue within the framework of a tournament revitalized by a past sponsor and sustained by a new one.

"I think Humana coming in with the Clinton Foundation probably gave the today into what they can be tomorrow. Improving global health, increasing opportunities for girls and women, reducing childhood obesity and preventable diseases, creating economic opportunity and growth, and helping communities address the effects of climate change are paramount issues.

When first introduced in 2012, the wellness angle of the Humana Challenge was unique among PGA Tour events, and so well received that the concept will continue without Humana. Foster says the tournament is fortunate to have the support of a foundation started by a former United States president and

CareerBuilder, to stress its message of wellness and heath care and to encourage individuals to take better care of themselves though nutritional and fitness education.

Although Humana got out early, many credit the company's sponsorship as crucial to saving the tournament. When Humana made the decision to get in with both feet in 2012, it was done in conjunction with the Clinton Foundation. The two organizations wanted to bring their wellness message to the PGA Tour and to the Coachella Valley. Humana may be CareerBuilder and the Clinton Foundation

tournament the spark and the notoriety it needed to jumpstart," Foster says. "[Now], it appears the foundation is going to stay and continue its conference and continue to work with the tournament and the community."

According to the Clinton Foundation, its mission is to unlock human potential through the power of creative collaboration by building partnerships between businesses, NGOs, governments and individuals everywhere. The idea is to work faster, better and leaner, to find solutions that last and to transform lives and communities from what they are

pursuing outcomes that all humans can get behind.

"Bill Clinton is one of the more congenial people you'll ever meet, and anyone who meets the President enjoys him whether Democrat, Independent or Republican," Foster says. "He's a very personable man and very interesting to talk to. And he's trying to go about his postpresidential days, doing good. So you have to respect that part of his legacy, and what he's doing with the tournament."

CareerBuilder

Has Big Plans for a Classic PGA Tour Event

As new title sponsor of the former Bob Hope Classic, CareerBuilder looks forward

fyou're that particular brand of fuddyduddy who doesn't like change one little bit, you're probably pretty upset with what's happening to the Coachella Valley's PGA Tour event.

On the other hand, if you're a believer in "Change is good," "If you're not moving forward, you're moving backward," "Adapt or die," or any other change=growth axiom, you're probably pretty excited about the upcoming CareerBuilder Challenge in partnership with the Clinton Foundation, and the continuing evolution of the event.

No matter which camp you reside in, it's a certainty that things are better today than during the dark days of The Great Recession, the subsequent withdrawal of longtime sponsor Chrysler and a fair-to-middling field. The times may not yet equal those halcyon days when Bob and Jackie and President Ford hammed it up with Arnie and Johnny and Jack for five days in front of massive galleries and NBC television cameras, but the tournament is surely moving in the right direction.

The 2016 CareerBuilder Challenge, scheduled for January 21-24, will be the

first with CareerBuilder's name on the event, replacing Humana, which opted out of an eight-year contract at the end of the 2015 tournament. CareerBuilder will be the tournament's second major corporate sponsor since Chrysler's departure, and its six-year commitment solidifies the tournament's immediate future. The Clinton Foundation, which became involved along with Humana in 2012 to stress wellness themes, will continue on with CareerBuilder, and both will work to reinforce wellness themes originally introduced by the Humana/Clinton



Foundation partnership. CareerBuilder will also engage in grassroots employment programs in the Coachella Valley and use those programs as models for similar efforts nationwide.

Scott Easton, managing director for the CareerBuilder Challenge, has been working with the tournament since 2001 and working full-time for the event since 2011. He says the PGA Tour, Desert Classic Charities and the Clinton Foundation worked together to find a partner that fit the sponsorship mold established by Humana, and CareerBuilder was that sponsor. Since the moment CareerBuilder's sponsorship was confirmed, the tournament staff has been working to re-brand the entire tournament presentation, from signage to the largest displays.

Easton says the move to the PGA West Stadium Course as the central event venue will give patrons improved access to available services. The nearby Nicklaus Tournament Course and La Quinta Country Club will also serve in the 2016 rotation.

"We're going to continue with that first-class appearance we've been presenting for the last several years," Easton says. "CareerBuilder's involvement and moving over to the Stadium Course at PGA West is going to make the event even more fanfriendly and fan-oriented. We've done a lot of things to enhance the spectator-sponsor experience outside the ropes. I think that's something that will be noticed by everyone this year."

The evolving sponsorship relationship is just one of many changes the tournament has seen over the years, including the previously mentioned, ever-changing course rotation. John Foster, Desert Classic Charities' president, says that when Humana came onboard in 2012, it gave the tournament a chance to make significant changes, including a long-anticipated format alteration. Additionally, the tournament was trimmed from five rounds to

four, the pro-am format was modified and the celebrity element was significantly pared back. Foster attributes the steady year-overyear strengthening of the tournament field to those factors, noting that the celebrity element generated great publicity for the tournament in another time and place.


"[The Pro-Ams are] are much friendlier for the pros to play in now," Foster says. "They're in more of a one-on-one situation now instead of trying to entertain three different people. They feel a responsibility to try and entertain, and when they have more that one person, it makes it difficult. They want to do a good job, but they also have to play good golf.


"I think the pros know this isn't the U.S. Open. It's early in the season, they're trying to get their games together, and they believe this is a good place to do that," Foster notes. "So there are a lot of factors involved, but it can't be denied that the format change has definitely helped."

Foster knows that the old Bob Hope Chrysler Classic days have left lasting memories, but the way he sees it, the celebrities are still on hand. "It's a different time now, there's no question. I'm not sure you'll ever see that again. It was a magical time. I think what we look at now is bringing in the top pros. They are the celebrities. They are the excitement."

Easton agrees. "We're constantly working on improving the player field and it has shown a lot of improvement over the last few years. I absolutely concur with John. The PGA Tour players are the stars of the event, and we are going to continue to work as hard as we can to get the best field we can."

any courses claim to be, or are described as, unique. When it comes to Rams Hill Golf Club, the adjective may actually be applicable.

Situated in eastern San Diego County in the town of Borrego Springs, California, and surrounded by ancient desert expanses, Rams Hill doesn't have truly comparable peers. There are Tom Fazio-designed courses speckled throughout Southern California, but only one has been scraped out of the prehistoric landscape that also makes up the Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. And though there are several other courses in the Borrego Springs area, no other has been designed by Fazio, universally recognized as one of this country's top course designers.

Some lifelong residents of Southern California have never been to the Anza-Borrego area, and some are unaware the area even exists—despite its status as California's largest state park. The recreational wonderland covers more than 600,000 acres between State Route 79 to the west and the Salton Sea to the east. The area offers five different mountain ranges, 500 miles of roads and endless geographic anomalies produced by the constant clash of continental plates.

While many urbanites remain unaware of its charms, in-theknow lovers of the great outdoors have flocked to the area for decades to take advantage of its isolated beauty, including campers, mountain bikers, hikers, four-wheelers and nature aficionados of every stripe. As Rams Hill opens for its seventh season as a Fazio iteration, it could be that the campers, hikers, and bikers will now throw their golf clubs in the back of the truck before heading out for an extended period of recreation.

The foothills location has produced a course that rides the side of a hill, creating a handful of holes that play uphill, others that play downhill and select holes with side-hill challenges. However, the design is such that there are very few cliff-side disasters laying in wait; in fact, the course corridors have been designed at such a width that the layout presents golfers with more of a links-style play. In other words, despite the hillside location, there is room to find and play a wild drive.

"I would say it's very playable," says Mike Setchell, director of golf. "The fairways are very forgiving and we've got five sets of tee boxes. You can play the course from 7,200 yards at the tips or 5,200 yards from the women's tees. The white tees are very generous, and then there are the member tees at 6,300 yards. So there's plenty of opportunity to play it however you want to.

"It has the feel of a links golf course. There are a lot of shots where, if you hit the left side of the green correctly, the ball bounces down, as it should. You can play the ball along the ground, and with a little imagination, you can see what the ball will do if you play the right shot."

Along with the Fazio name, Setchell says course's condition will also be a major draw. The location and climate has allowed for the cultivation of thriving fairways and bent-grass greens of the highest grade. "For a public golf course, it's pretty spectacular," he says. "The conditions are like any of the high-end courses in this area, whether it's The Vintage, the Madison Club or Bighorn. It's in that kind of condition."

Setchell, who also serves as course concierge, onsite real-estate agent and private resort rental contractor, notes that two of his favorite holes are prime examples of what the course has to offer.



The par-5 No. 11 plays downhill, and if the creek to the left of the fairway is full, Setchell says, it's equivalent to Class III rapids barreling down the hill, over a waterfall and pouring into the water feature left of the green. Fairway bunkers left may help save nervous players from a ride down the rapids, and while it's possible to reach the green in two, elaborate bunkering and the pond left stiffen the challenge.

Another of Setchell's favorites is No. 17, a drivable par 4 that plays 302 yards. Aside from its inherent visual beauty, the elevated, kidney-shaped green has two

distinct levels and players don't want to be on the wrong one. "I've made more birdies by not hitting a driver than by hitting a driver," Setchell says. "I usually hit about 210 to 215 yards, throw a little wedge up there and see how close I can get. It's another example of how you have to play smart at this golf course. It's very playable, but you can't always just go, go, go. You have to think your way around it."



ylan World Team Tennis (WTT) converged in the desert once again during an idyllic November weekend, bringing its co-founder and flag-bearer, Billie Jean King.

The household name, known for her unparalleled athleticism and internationally acclaimed activism for equality in sports, was on hand for the 10th consecutive year at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden to welcome 490 tennis players on 67 teams to celebrate the annual year-end "nationals" for WTT recreational and corporate leagues.

Amid ongoing construction at the Tennis Garden, teams gathered to compete for three straight days, with overflow court space provided at Palm Valley Country Club, also in Indian Wells, and Monterey Country Club in Palm Desert.

Having just completed its 40th year, King's WTT format is thriving. It features gender-equal teams comprised of two men, two women and a coach. In addition to competing, players took advantage of one-on-one instruction from King, who provided her customary clinics to each team followed by spirited team photos.

In an interview with Desert Golf & Tennis between matches and a private player's reception at the Tennis Garden, King was joined by another American tennis icon and Hall of Famer, Rosie Casals.

King explained that one of her favorite parts of the national championships weekend and WTT play is the chance to interact with the players personally. She said, "I like to ask all the players about their past year, especially since the Nationals are a big deal. They've really grown. And I love hearing everyone talk about their team names." (In case you're wondering, she's referring to names like the "Boston Bangers" and the "Las Vegas Avengers.")

She continued, "These people are here because they have a true passion for playing, plus it's very social. Every team has to play every single day. It's also very tiring. It's totally different from tournament play.

"A lot of what WTT is all about is the chance for players to try new things. In the clinics, they get to try out different Wilson racquets - and of course, I won the Riggs match with a Wilson racquet."

Emphasizing the importance of the WTT format, King said, "WTT is used on college campuses because it keeps those 18-22 year olds involved in the sport. It's also great for players who aren't quite at the varsity level. I'd actually like to see all NJTLs use the format because it's all-inclusive of gender, and it connects people."

King and Casals reminisced about having first met in 1964 at the Berkeley Tennis Club, as King started gaining notoriety after winning the Wimbledon women's doubles title with partner Karen Hantze Susman. Casals said of that time, "I had definitely heard of Billie Jean." As for the then up-and-coming Casals, King said, "I remember saying to teammates, 'This is the kind of kid that will beat us."

She was right. Casals, of course, also went on to become an International Hall of Famer and a pioneer, along with King, in demanding equal pay for women on the tennis courts, which served as a catalyst to permanent social change and equality for women throughout the country. The two legends remain close friends and collaborators today, committed to making tennis userfriendly and enjoyable for amateurs and youth.

Both women are products of early training on public courts— King in Long Beach and Casals in San Francisco—and they are staunch supporters of making tennis more available to younger kids and ensuring they receive the support they need to succeed, through access, equipment and encouragement.

King said, "We must get those grassroots numbers up for young people entering tennis, and part of that is by making sure it's fun. The great thing about the WTT format for kids is that it gives them the flexibility play on a team or gives them the ability to play individually. Either way, the early involvement and team play are what develop their leadership, and these things bring passion and purpose."

Casals lives year-round in the desert while King divides her time between New York and California. Casals said King likes to "live vertically" because of her equal affinity for the skyscrapers of New York and the peaceful panorama of the desert. King isn't sure if she and her life partner, Ilana Kloss (who is the CEO and Commissioner of Mylan WTT) would ever live in the desert full time, but Casals reminded King that she never thought she'd ever move away from San Francisco.


King fondly recalled making the big trip from Long Beach to Palm Springs to play in junior tournaments when she was 13 years old, feeling excited every time she made the journey. She said, "The desert has a beauty all its own. California has everything. I guess you could say California is in my soul forever."

That's a good thing for the crop of junior tennis players who will benefit from her vision and influence, and it's also pretty awesome for all the others in the Golden State who are able to unabashedly express themselves as equals on the tennis court and in the world.

Anyone who has an interest in golf keenly watched the climactic final holes of The British Open and U.S. Open championships, played at St. Andrews and Chambers Bay, respectively.

You will not find two more diametrically opposed golfholes. It's like comparing deepest, darkest Africa on the equator to the North Pole. In their own respective ways, both holes could be described as 'quirky' and 'unusual.'

Let's start with the tee shots. At Chambers Bay, a par 5 of roughly 550 yards (dependent upon which tee is played) gives the best players in the world a target area of around 20 yards in width. Over to the 18th at St Andrews and it's around 120 yards wide. And

while Chambers Bay is a devilish par 5, St Andrews, is a (sometimes) drivable par 4.

What's it like driving at the 18th at Chambers Bay on the 72nd hole in the U.S. Open? Consider this year. In the heat of battle, Jordan Spieth is playing with Dustin Johnson and the championship is likely going to be decided at the 72nd hole. There is huge pressure on both players. Spieth had just made a ghastly double bogey on the par-3 17th hole, virtually his only mistake during the entire round. Johnson, one of the longest hitters on the Tour, drove the ball beautifully all day. But herein lies the problem: neither has won a U.S. Open and both practically have their hands on the title.

A few years ago at Pebble Beach, Johnson was leading by a margin after three rounds and had an outstanding chance. But it was not meant to be. You have to wonder if that memory was flickering through his mind at the crucial moment. As for Spieth, having double-bogeyed the previous hole, he had to follow





Johnson's ear-busting drive, which must've been well over 350 yards through the 20-yard gap. Follow that he did and came up just short of a deep bunker, but placed himself with a slight uphill lie on the fairway.

We all know how the story ended. Johnson, with a seven-yard putt for an eagle, somehow managed to three-putt down the slippery slope from a relatively short distance. Spieth, who took The Masters title earlier in the year, won two consecutive Majors in a row at the age of 21.

Chambers Bay is an interesting but very different type of challenge for The U.S. Open and it came in for substantial criticism. The course was bone dry and running fast and the condition of the greens was no credit to a U.S. Open venue. One of the players described them as 'like putting over broccoli.' Two of the greens had been replaced a couple of years prior and looked good. I heard no one explain why all 18 greens had not been replaced. There must surely have been a reason but it never surfaced.

As I mentioned, criticism abounded. The early forward tee placement on No. 18 received considerable comment from the players. It might have been the most difficult fairway to hit in the history of Major golf, particularly off the forward tee (see the diagram). From the forward tee, it pretty much forced players to challenge the 20-yard gap. Some of the longest hitters went through this exceedingly narrow gap and landed in the lone bunker on the right, at a distance of 360-yards from this forward tee. Even the calm and well-mannered Spieth muttered a word or two under his breath about No. 18 in his opening round. He has now discovered the power of television's roving microphones!

As for this year's British Open on The Old Course at St Andrews, it was full of thrills and spills. The weather hit in a big way. The second round took two full days to play. Following a three-hour rain delay on Friday, Saturday was almost wiped out due to a 10-plus hour wind delay.

The 18th hole is aptly named after Old Tom Morris. It's 356 yards long and the fairway, in contrast to the 18th fairway at

Chambers Bay, is a massive 120-yards wide and there is not a bunker in sight. Other than the dreaded Valley of Sin, it lies defenseless. But this devious swale has claimed many an Open victim. In the 1995 Open, Constantino Rocca fluffed his approach into this punishing dell but then pulled off an escape worthy of Houdini, putting from 60 feet straight into the hole for a play-off against John Daly. Back in the clubhouse, the engraver had already started work on engraving 'John Daly' as Open Champion.

No one old enough will ever forget the 1970 Open when Doug Sanders hit his approach way too long in order to avoid the Valley of Sin. He ended up 40 feet beyond the hole, putted to three feet and then missed the infamous short putt, which effectively lost him the prized Claret Jug when Jack Nicklaus went on to win in the playoff. Many years later, when asked if he ever thought of his great disappointment, Sanders replied, "I only think about it three times every day."


This year, Zac Johnson birdied the 72nd hole to go on to win a three-way playoff. I was in London at the time watching the final drama as it played out. Johnson came off the 18th green and received a congratulatory hug from his wife. Golf commentator Peter Alliss, with his usual wry wit, exclaimed, "And Mrs. Johnson is now planning her new kitchen."

Peter and I were partners in our British golf design business some years ago and we both commentated for golf on BBC Television. A couple of weeks after The Open, my wife Linda and I were lunching with Peter and his wife, Jackie, at a 16th Century inn in the English countryside.

"Can you believe it?" Peter said. "My comment about Mrs. Johnson's new kitchen resulted in over 600 viewers complaining to the BBC."

Wow! Political correctness is clearly rampant even on the 72nd hole!

eeping a low profile in highprofile positions is quite the feat. In the case of Steve Simon, former tournament director and chief operating officer overseeing the BNP Paribas Open, Simon has managed to do just that. During his 1 l-year tenure at the Indian Wells Tennis Gardens (IWTG) in Indian Wells, California, and 27 years overall with the event, Simon was the driving force behind the BNP as it grew to one of the largest tennis events in the world, welcoming more than 456,000 fans in 2015. Mention his lowprofile success and Simon blushes, chuckles and admits, "That's just the way I like it."

Until Nov. 30, Simon continued to work out of his office at the IWTG as he transitioned from his former position to his new one as CEO of the Women's Tennis Association (WTA), based out of Florida.

Following the resignation of WTA CEO Stacey Allaster for personal reasons, all eyes turned to Simon. Within 13 days and following a unanimous vote from the WTA board of directions. Simon, in his casual-vet no-nonsense fashion, accepted the offer.

"I'm not one to drag out decisions," he says. "It either makes sense or it doesn't make sense. After talking to my family and my associates at the Tennis Gardens and getting support and encouragement to accept, it was an easy decision for me to make, and a very exciting one."

A California native, Simon started playing tennis at the age of 10. "It was through my father, who was an avid tennis player," he says. "He played every Saturday morning at Arcadia County Park, in Arcadia, California. That is where I grew up. I loved anything with a ball, any sport, so I would follow him there and hit balls on the backboard when they were done and it grew from there."

Simon started competing at age 14 and continued through high school and college. During his collegiate days, however, he realized that the professional tennis tour was probably not the right career path and he turned to teaching tennis instead. After several years, Simon admits to getting a "real" job when he started at Adidas, where he worked for six years before transitioning to the tournament.

"It's an interesting story," he notes. "When I went to Adidas, it was one of the first sponsors of this tournament. My job with Adidas was to service the sponsorship agreement, which at that time, I believe, was the Congoleum Classic. This is where I got to know Charlie [Pasarell] and Raymond [Moore]. When I decided to leave Adidas, the gentleman I was working for told Raymond that I was leaving."

The rest, as they say, is history.

Simon says he wasn't looking to go anywhere and was very happy at the IWTG. However, "When I got the call from the WTA board, they asked me to consider the position and [told me] that I was their unanimous choice. It was a very humbling experience for me because the board members are my peers. It was also very exciting because there aren't too many times in a lifetime or career that you are provided a platform that you can truly go into and maybe make changes that can bring the betterment of either a business or a situation like this on the ATP tour or the WTA tour. It was something I couldn't pass up and feel I would have regretted if I didn't take the challenge on."


Simon is quick to point out that he's not going to reinvent the wheel at the WTA but rather, "Take a very successful business in an area with a great platform to work from and take it to the next level. For me, that means striving to make it a premium product that fans, players, sponsors, the media and staff all will want to align with, consume and invest in.

"I've never been one to set limits on myself. This is not a stepping stone for me career-wise," he adds. "I hope to end my career with the WTA. Time will tell how long that is, but I'm going into this with a long-term vision, not a short one."

Is this California native leaving the desert for Florida permanently? Simon laughs. "I'll never leave California permanently. We are going to keep our residence here and I will relocate to Florida because that is where the office is and that is where I need to be. However, the desert is where I'll retire to and I'll always be a Southern Californian at heart."

hen you think about the next generation of golfs superstars, four names probably come to mind above all others: Rory McIlroy, Jordan Spieth, Jason Day and Rickie Fowler. After all, they have a combined 27 PGA Tour wins, including seven Majors.

But don't forget about Brooks Koepka, a 25-year-old native of Florida who claimed his first PGA Tour title at the 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open—by shooting 64 and 66 during the weekend for a one-stroke victory.

"Brooks stepped up and grabbed the spotlight by hitting a 50foot eagle putt on the 15th hole during the final round, and then hitting a perfect drive down the middle of the fairway on No. 18," says Dan Mahoney, tournament chairman of the Waste Management Phoenix Open. "He handled the pressure very well."

Prior to his win, Koepka had already captured a European Tour event in November 2014, as well as four titles on the European Challenge Tour. He had also finished in the top 10 in his previous two PGA Tour appearances. But TPC Scottsdale's Stadium Course brought out the best in him and led him to realize his potential on golfs biggest stage: the PGA Tour.

"Phoenix is a good place to jumpstart careers," Mahoney explains. "Brooks is so talented, I wouldn't be surprised to see him win this tournament again."

This year Koepka will be competing against a field of 132 players, many who will be searching for their first PGA Tour

"There are so many incredibly talented competitors on the PGA Tour, each of whom has the ability to win any given week," Mahoney notes. "It should be an exciting tournament for fans to watch firsthand."

Last year, the Waste Management Phoenix Open, widely renowned as the highest attended golf tournament in the world, set a new weekly attendance record—564,368—surpassing the previous record by nearly 1,400. Known now as "The People's Major" for the wide array of amenities and entertainment options it offers to attendees, the tournament will certainly retain its reputation as the Tour's most exciting.

Just in time for the 2016 event, which will be contested from Feb. 4-7, the Stadium Course's famous 16th-hole amphitheater— The Coliseum—will feature 20 more skyboxes, increasing the total to nearly 220. A high-end luxury suite complex, The Bay Club, has also recently been completed. Located on the northern end of the 17th hole, a drivable par 4, it will feature 20 sky boxes and connect to the brand new Greenskeeper VIP Stadium, which offers guests four super suites, 10 greenside tables and 12 skyboxes.

After witnessing the action, attendees can also visit the Coors Light Birds Nest, a party tent and nightclub for the 21-and-over crowd located outdoors directly across the street from the Stadium Course. This year, the Birds Nest will host Rascal Flatts, who have a combined 15 No. 1 singles, on Wednesday, Feb. 3. Phoenix native and country artist Dierks Bentley will play on Feb. 4 and Robin Thicke takes the stage on Feb. 5 to start the weekend.

Each day, the venue will open at 3:30 and close at 10:30 p.m. The headline concerts are anticipated to begin around 8:30 p.m. so that guests can enjoy a full day of golf prior to the music. The final concerts will occur on Saturday, Feb. 6, shortly after the third



round concludes; Saturday's headline act will be announced soon.

Prior to the first round, attendees can also watch practice rounds on Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 1 and 2. Aside from the practice rounds, they can also witness a Pro-Am on Monday, as well as a variety of activities on Tuesday including motivational

speeches from PGA Tour members, a junior golf clinic on the practice range and a Special Olympics Open on TPC Scottsdale's putting green. In addition, the annual Annexus Pro-Am will be held on Wednesday, offering participants an opportunity to golf alongside some of their favorite professionals.

Daily general admission is free on Monday and Tuesday, \$30 on Wednesday and Thursday and \$40 on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Children age 17 and under can watch the tournament free of charge. And tickets will be available at the gate all week long, as the tournament is never sold out.

Monies raised by the tournament will once again be donated to local charities such as The First Tee of Phoenix, Special Olympics Arizona and the Phoenix Children's Hospital. Last year, the tournament's hosts, The Thunderbirds, a Phoenix-based, nonprofit civic group, provided \$9,060,731 to charities, an all-time tournament record.

"That's ultimately the reason we are doing all of this—to create charitable dollars," Mahoney says. "Not only will guests have a great time watching the tournament in person and attending concerts, they'll also have the opportunity to support a great cause and give back to their community."



If you were to go back through a round and calculate how many strokes you could subtract from your score if you had made all your putts inside of five feet, you would surely make huge strides to lowering your score. So how do we improve short putts? I like using rubber bands along with alignment sticks to help condition my putting muscles so I can drill more short putts.

ALIGNMENT STICKS

I start off by using alignment sticks to align myself to the hole, which for our training is four to five feet away. The purpose of the alignment sticks is to help me see my line to the hole. The inside stick is aimed at the inside edge of the hole while the outside stick is aimed at the outside edge. Using the sticks as a guide, I can position my setup perfectly aligned to the hole.

I personally like to have my putting stroke go straight back and straight through in relation to the hole. The heel of my putter is guided by the edge of the inside stick. As I make my forward stroke, the putter heel continues to move along that edge. I don't like the feeling of arcing my stroke, which in turn would open and close the putter face as it moves on an arc.

RUBBER BANDS

During lessons, clients often tell me that they can't feel a straight back and straight through stroke. The putter wobbles around as they are making the stroke. This is where rubber bands can help. The resistance of the bands helps condition your putting muscles, actually helping them to get the feel for where your straight back, straight through stroke is located.

To train the muscles, I push a tee into the ground between the alignment sticks to serve as an anchor. I tie two rubber bands together and loop one end of the rubber band around the tee. I stretch out the other end and put the putter head inside the rubber band so it is in the center of the putter face.

When I set up between the alignment sticks, it's important that I feel tension, meaning I'm actually using my muscles to hold onto the putter at address. The key muscles I want to feel in the putting stroke are "core muscles." That helps my hands feel like they are holding on to the putter lightly. As I make the back swing, I try to relax my muscles and allow the resistance from the rubber bands to move the putter back. Obviously, I have to have some tension in my muscles or the rubber band would fling the putter back too fast.



The most important thing I try to feel is "controlling the rubber band." I don't want the rubber band to control me so that my stroke is wobbling around in relation to the alignment sticks. By controlling the band, I am stabilizing the path of the stroke of the putter. Then, as I make my forward stroke, my primary goal is to have an exact finish point where I hold my finish for a five-second count.






FEEL THE STROKE

After I have made ten practice strokes with the rubber bands along the alignment sticks, I hit some putts. My goal is to feel the same stroke as in the practice strokes. I want to feel the rubber bands move my putter back and through along the line to the hole through the resistance from the practice drill.







igh season in the desert means the joints are jumping; it is the time of year when restaurants roll out their best dishes. As the weather cools and the drive from one end of the valley to the other via Highway 111 becomes ethereally lit sunrise to sunset, it's the perfect time to pamper taste buds with breakfast, lunch or dinner at a bevy of creative, sexy and cool places.

One experience unique to the desert is the presence of decent weather for year round al fresco dining. One of the most magical locales to experience such a treat on a crisp fall or winter day is the patio of Lavender Bistro (78073 Calle Barcelona, La Quinta; 760.564.5353). A succulent pistachio-crusted Australian rack of lamb

on a goat cheese polenta cake or a bowl of steaming mussels in a broth of white wine, thyme and garlic with the legendary truffle fries may be savored against a backdrop of trees illuminated trunks to tops by hundreds of tiny, sparkling lights. Larger parties can head to the restaurant's upper level to dine in one of the cabanas. lavenderbistro.com




For a classic French bistro, also with an al fresco patio that delivers potential for starlit meals, check out **La Brasserie** (Plaza La Quinta, 78477 Hwy.111, La Quinta; 760.771.4400). Authentic and charming, this is the place to go when craving coq au vin, frog legs or perhaps a romantic duck a l'orange for two. Daily specials are featured in addition to regular menu including such favorites as veal osso bucco. This season, try the famed Queen Royal cocktail with Cemant D'Alsace (from Chef Emmanuel's home region of France), honey liquor and Ashurst Family honeycomb. It perfectly complements any of three new foie gras dishes as well. *labrasserielaquinta.com*



For contemporary small plates that are artistic, ever changing and passionately presented, try **Cork and Fork** (47875 Caleo Bay Drive, #A106, La Quinta; 760.777.7555). Current highlights from chef/owner Andie Hubka include a bowl of beer battered crispy cauliflower with siriacha aioli, pomegranate molasses and pine-nut gremolata; lobster risotto with mascarpone, lemon emulsion and fresh herbs; and a local date plate of Pt. Reyes blue cheese stuffed Medjools with toasted almonds and garlic-chive-oil drizzle. Accentuated with fantastic boutique wines from around the world and a great craft beer program, this place invites the adventurous palate. 




Located on the top level of the Gardens on El Paseo, Wilma and Frieda, (73575 El Paseo, Palm Desert; 760.773.2807) named for the owners' grandmothers, offers just plain fun food. For breakfast, indulge in the addictively airy custard-style, bread-pudding French toast. Wash it down with the pecan-wood-bacon Bloody Mary. Or stop by for dinner to taste new rustic but elevated nighttime meals by Chef Chad Spears, such as chicken and biscuits in your own personal cast-iron pot. No matter what time of day you visit, don't forget to order one of the tarts, which are reminiscent of Pop Tarts but pumped up for adult taste buds and strewn with ribbons of Madagascar vanilla crème anglaise. wilmafrieda.com






Head up the hill to the glamorous Ritz Carlton, Rancho Mirage (68900 Frank Sinatra Drive, Rancho Mirage) for two diverse options in dining. At **State Fare Bar & Kitchen** (760.202.4710) you'll find whimsical comfort food such as slow-braised short ribs on mashed potatoes with roasted carrots. **The Edge Steakhouse** (760.321.8282) features an incomparable panoramic view of the valley along with more than 15 cuts of prime meat to choose from including 120-day-aged and Wagyu. Watch the sun go down from that miraculous viewpoint during Sunset Cocktail Hour. *ritzcarlton.com*

The crisp, white minimalist vibe at Eight4Nine Restaurant (849 N. Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs; 760.808.1077) has been described as reminiscent of Alice in Wonderland's tea party. Opened earlier this year in a historic post-office building in Palm Springs, it boasts funky yet elegant décor and food. Try Willa Jean's fried chicken-named after the mother of one of the owners with corn and buttermilk potatoes, breadand-butter pickled green tomatoes, lemonsage gravy and truffle-honey drizzle. Or the No. 1 bestseller: a sourdough-crusted









Chilean sea bass with Dungeness crab-stuffed piquillo peppers, saffron aioli and greens.

Finally, in true rock-and-roll fashion, the Hard Rock Hotel's Simon Kitchen + Bar (150 South Indian Canyon Drive, Palm Springs; 760.325.9676) has wickedly indulgent treats. The Porchetta is a pork belly wrapped around a pork loin that's brined, rubbed, trussed and roasted and served with applesauce, cornbread and a bacon-apple relish. Equally sinful is the



homemade foie gras agnolotti with roasted black walnuts, escarole and date gastrique. Finish with a decadent dessert honoring the namesake chef who recently passed away: the Simon Junkfood Platter piled with made-to-order cotton candy, cookies, brownies, caramel corn, faux-Hostess cupcakes and other treats from childhood all made in-house. hrhpalmsprings.com

or those with a refined taste and heavy wallet, Acura isn't a name comes to mind when thinking about exotic cars. But it should.

Since its early days as a game changer, the Acura NSX has carried more than its own weight in the exotic car market. Some say that the NSX woke Ferrari up to the fact that it was phoning in some of its interior design. Others suggest the NSX was better than Porsche in every way in those early years of horsepower and aluminum.

In 2005, the NSX was shelved for Acura's more popular sedans. Underground, designers went back to the drawing board—quietly. Occasionally a spy photo or auto report would surface of a supposed new version, but the truth was hard to find. Enthusiasts gave up on the idea and the world forgot that the NSX was once a force in the market.

In 2016, Acura returns the NSX to the market with a stunning new predator. Fits and starts in the design saw prototypes come and go. This one is here to stay.

To Acura's credit, someone found a can of common sense lying around and, like Popeye with spinach, took a swallow for strength and scrapped the age-old adage that all engines must be repurposed from the mother ship's (Honda) parts. The unused parts bin was no place to build a contender. Instead, the NSX got a whole makeover from drivetrain to headlights that put it squarely on the front lines of the super-car market.

While Honda has had only one turbo engine in the past decade, Acura's team

eventually tossed the idea that the NSX could work without turbo. Instead, it has a longitudinally mounted, twin-turbo charged V6. The little unit breathes fire to the tune of 573 horsepower. Married to the gas engine are three electric motors. One powers the rear wheels while two independently drive the front wheels. This hybrid combination gives the sort of the off-the-line launch that made NASA such a dream for young boys aspiring to greatness.

It is a little early to attribute greatness to the NSX; however, the design certainly eludes boring without much effort. The wide, low wheelbase challenges any notion that this is a prepubescent afterthought from Acura. This fully grown beast looks hungry from every angle. Two large air intakes in the front grill and two behind the door serve up down force and cool lifegiving air to the engine while creating a sense of eagerness. The thin chrome strip above the grill is simple in the way of panache. Nothing overstated here.

The LED headlamps are six points of light in a constellation that is the NSX. The aggressive lighting contours continue on the rear bumper, giving a modern look to the raw design. The roofline curves like it's built to help an athlete feel comfortable inside a car that shouldn't fit someone that size. The swooping nature lends a sense of motion that foreshadows what's to come.

Inside everything is as it should be. Here the best of Acura is accentuated, including the simple design of the control panel. The center console knob accesses the main features at a turn. There's no mystery in the experience.



component is clear and functions as a driver expects—which is to say, it's brilliant.

While the pedigree of the NSX may lack the European flavor that car enthusiasts have worshipped for over a century, the fundamentals are no less prestigious. Power and torque compete on the world stage handily and the design is eye-catching as well as technically superior.

With a 0-to-60 time under 3.0 seconds, the NSX is the real deal. The line to get one may be the true indicator. Dealerships are scrambling to keep up with requests before the car even hits showrooms. A price tag around \$150,000 puts this in reachable range for those boys who dreamed of greatness.

If you've ever wondered what to do with old golf clubs, visit this gallery

When the golfers, snowbirds and sun seekers of all variety hit the Coachella Valley each winter, it's a possibility, nay, a probability, that the art lovers within will seek a commemoration of their stay.

They'll have at hand several retail venues offering the usual—amazing photography highlighting the valley's top golf holes, a framed watercolor of Arnold Palmer at La Quinta Country Club, an oversized coffee-table book highlighting mid-century modern architecture.

The informed and discerning visitor, however, should head instead to the Elena Bulatova Fine Art Gallery in downtown Palm Springs. Co-owned with Israel-born artist Efi Mashiah and set to celebrate its second anniversary, Bulatova's gallery doesn't have any of the aforementioned golf mementos. What is does have is whimsical-yet-significant pieces of art, some of which, in fact, are comprised completely of assembled golf-club heads and other golf-club components.

The gallery, located at 232 N. Palm Canyon Drive, is open daily from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. and just one of the venues where Bulatova's work can be seen in Palm Springs. The Elena Bulatova Studio & Gallery is at 2652 S. Cherokee Way and is open Tuesday to Sunday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and by appointment other days.

Her works are also on display at The Five Hundred at 500 S. Palm Canyon Drive and the Three Sixty North Grill & Bar at 360 N. Palm Canyon Drive. In December, Bulatova and Mashiah are also scheduled to open a new gallery in the prestigious Gallery Row within The Shops at Crystals (theshopsatcrystals.com) in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Bulatova was born in Russia and trained in Russian art schools for seven years. In those days, however, her first love was music and it was in the musical realm where she exerted most of her creative energies. She played violin and piano while in school, and played violin in the chamber orchestra at Moscow State University while studying there.

Today, her California gallery draws customers from the valley and around the world. She says that 50 percent of the gallery's artwork is sold and shipped to customers in other states as well as Europe, Mexico and Australia. Yet even as her artwork is disseminated worldwide and as she expands her empire into Nevada, Bulatova says Palm Springs has become home.

Bulatova began painting full time after moving to the United States five years ago and says her adopted country is a great place to live and to create. She started with abstract paintings and has recently moved into sculpture, employing an array of creative media. A majority of the gallery's showcase pieces are made from all manner of recycled materials, including the club components. There are also works created from recycled Harley-Davidson parts, courtesy of Mr. Santo, a contributing artist from Thailand.

"I think it is great to take something that doesn't have any more use and create new purpose and life," Bulatova says.

Presently, she is expanding her Sweet Life series of pieces, which features various exploitations of one of the world's favorite sugary treats—the ones on a stick with the tempting chocolate center—using wood, fiberglass, resin and industrial paint. The gallery also

currently features Mashiah's "Screw Art" collection, which is just that—pieces created with different-colored flathead screws.

"I have very big plans for the galleries and myself as an artist," says Bulatova, who will present shows in Miami in December. "I am looking to grow in my career and create something different. I am fortunate to have a great response to my work from art collectors. This inspires me to create more, stay prolific, move forward and grow faster."

The downtown Palm Springs gallery typically stays open late on Thursday nights to coincide with the city's Villagefest, and contributing artists are often onsite to discuss their works. There's a strong chance the discriminating visitor/collector will find the perfect piece to remind them of their special time in the desert and to express their love of golf and their love of progressive, contemporary art.



She's Got Game!

An iconic designer's new golf fashions deliver one elegant stroke after another

t was an epiphany for the young model. Walking the catwalk in a simple knit dress, Marie St. John suddenly lusted after it for her own wardrobe. She was so desperate she was debating paying a pretty penny for it. "After all, it already had my name on it," she had mused. "Better yet, I could make it myself!"

And although she knew nothing about the craft—assigned to knit a sock in a class, she became stymied by the heel and left it to her mother to finish the job—the determined model went to shop for yarn and knitting needles and the resulting sleeveless off-white dress with mock turtleneck was a big success. The simple, comfortable, flattering style was a harbinger for the future collections.

Then, when working as model on the TV hit Queen for A Day, she wheeled out a new knitting machine and it was a "Eureka!" moment. St. John immediately paid \$450 for it and hired the sales representative to show her how to use it.

But the real genesis for St. John's future took place when she decided to impress her flancé, fashion industry entrepreneur Bob Gray, with her knitting skills. Ultimately, with Gray's expert salesmanship and marketing expertise and St. John's designs achieving innovative perfection, the St. John Knits collection made its way to the racks of exclusive retailers and upscale specialty stores. It was an all-American company with a lock on a product that appealed to all-American fashionistas of all ages who didn't have to sell their first-borns to afford the clothes.

St. John's early days did not seem to point to fashion destiny. She was born in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, in the 1930s, but when her two sisters and her family immigrated to Winnipeg, Canada, in the '40s, their days of sleeping in bomb shelters and standing in line for milk and bread in the communist nation were over. St. John was free to dream of trilling her way to a coloratura career in the opera. Soon, that dream became a wake-up call to another destiny.





Founded by Marie and Bob Gray in 1962 as a small family business, St. John grew to a \$400 million fashion house and one of the largest vertically integrated women's apparel brands in the world.

Who is the St. John lady? She's a woman who handily chairs charities, fosters fundraisers and has standing appointments for manicures and coifs. She runs businesses, banks, brokerages, real estate companies and corporations. She's a politician and a party-giver at the drop of a birth date, cradle to grave. She never leaves the house unless in full, fabulous battle dress—coif to pump. Luxury to her is not a label; it's time.

The designer says the St. John wardrobe made life easy. It was fast fashion for life in the fast lane. The company stood alone in the country for knitting up neat little exuberantly hued suits detailed with bright shiny buttons, glittering palettes and golden chains. These were wardrobes that would keep you perking along comfortably and forgive you if you actually finished that croissant. Yarns twisted of special Australian wool and rayon shake off wrinkles. And in 1996, another component was added to the mix when Marie's daughter Kelly Gray introduced woven apparel with a younger outlook but the same adherence to quality.

Marie St. John Gray is proof that you can have it all, something the designer has always believed. And after 23 years off the course, it was time to get back in the game. "I'm passionate about golf," she says. She originally took up the sport for recreation and ended up winning California's Championship Amateur Women's Golf Tournament a few years later. "I'm getting back in shape for this new round," she laughs, adding, "It's not easy!"

At the Gray's boutique, Grayse El Paseo, mother and daughter Marie and Kelly keep the design house's tradition ongoing. Why shouldn't life be as elegant, efficiently workable and as effortlessly chic on the golf course as everywhere else? St. John Knits have always been known for day and evening, work and play, on-duty and off any clock. And though the mother-daughter duo departed from the company a decade ago, the same holds true for their new collections.

The two place high value on timeless style, careful fit and attention to detail. Their collection, composed of exquisite handcrafted leather jackets, striking prints and exquisite embellishment, is mostly produced at the company's Irvine, California, headquarters. They are currently developing a complete golf apparel line and, as with other apparel, it is a work in progress and being tested and worn by the designer herself. It's a dress code worth waiting for, she says.

The newest fabrics are lightweight, especially important in the heat and brutal sunshine of the desert, and they wick away any moisture, inviting cool air into the body while providing protective coverage. The Grays insist that all fabrics must have a bit of stretch for freedom of movement and comfort.

"My focus and our company's focus is really ultimately, the comfort of the clothes. It's not about the catwalk, the magazines and the exposure we get from celebrities," Marie says. "It's ultimately about the customer who buys it, wears it and loves it.

It's going to be a beautiful game and beyond. Fore!

Shine Like the Star you are this Holiday Season

Chanel, Roberto Coin and Gurhan can help you put on the sparkle



oliday season usually means being in the spotlight more than usual. Making appearances at parties, reconnecting with family and meeting friends are all good reasons to make sure you're ready for the glare. Three jewelry designers will have you camera-ready whenever and wherever you're celebrating.

CHANEL

Two pieces in Chanel's Comète collection will make you shine like the star you are at every event, while also harnessing the power and history behind every inspiration of Coco Chanel. In 1932, the iconic designer was famously quoted as saying, "I wanted to cover women in constellations. Stars! Stars of all sizes." Stars, crescent moons and comets are now recognized as three of Chanel's trademark emblems.

The Comète ring in 18K white gold and diamonds features two shooting stars formed by 39 dazzling white diamonds, which pass each other at opposing ends of the ring. The ring weighs 7.7 grams and retails for \$8,100.

The Comète pendant, also in 18K white gold and diamonds, showcases a single, five-pronged star measuring threequarters of an inch and filled with pure white diamonds (0.80 ct.). The pendant hangs delicately on a 15-inch mini-link chain of white gold and is available for \$8.200.

ROBERTO COIN

Roberto Coin will also make you shine with several dazzling pieces. Founded in Vicenza, Italy, known as the City of Gold, in 1977, the Roberto Coin brand launched in 1996. Both the brand and the man for which it's named are known for high standards that emphasize style and environmental responsibility. Coin creates over 600 new designs each year for international wearers, and his finished works are worn by celebrities and fashion leaders.

The New Barocco braided five-row diamond bangle in 18K yellow and white gold circles the wrist with twisted rope strands of filigreed gold, the top half of which is laced with delicate diamonds (3.15ct.). Finished with a box clasp, the piece sells for \$19,800.

The Roberto Coin Primavera Stretch Wrap bracelet, also worn simply as a standalone accessory, features 18K rose and white gold with diamonds (0.20ct.) and retails for \$3.000. The six-row woven design coils around the arm and, of course, Roberto Coin's signature ruby rests inside the piece, to "kiss" the skin of its wearer.

Going beyond sparkle and into the realm of royalty, the Roberto Coin Princess Collection includes the large Princess bangle in 18K yellow gold sprinkled with Florentine diamond dots (1.95ct.). The side view surprises with hand-etched detailing. This roundedsquare piece of body art can be purchased for \$18,500.

The equally stunning Princess earrings, also in 18K yellow gold with diamonds (0.70ct.), are available for \$6,300.

Roberto Coin's creations are said to be unique pieces that capture and express emotion, and the Roberto Coin Golden Gate ring in 18K yellow and white gold is an illustrative example. A sleek, sculptural gold surface is accented by a single diamond (0.04ct.). Seemingly unadorned, the underside of the ring presents an unexpected array of intricately woven gold threads that resemble the wires of the Golden Gate Bridge, the designer's interpretation of the San Francisco structure. The polished band sells for \$2.500.

The coordinating Golden Gate teardrop necklace features an oval pendant presented with thin strands of 18K yellow gold crisscrossing the top and transitioning into a polished 18K yellowgold surface with a diamond accent (0.04ct.) at the bottom. The study in contrasting textures and shapes is fixed to an 18-inch rolo chain and retails for \$1.780.

The Roberto Coin Golden Gate hoop earrings in 18k yellow gold are both elegant and strong, reflecting the iconic bridge's architectural dominance. These pieces share another characteristic with namesake: an impressive technological feat, thanks to a clasp that closes by itself. The brilliant earrings display a diamond accent (0.09ct.) front and center. They are available for \$3,100.

GURHAN

To make sure you stand out as one of a kind, literally, designer Gurhan Orhan has crafted truly unique pieces as part of his Paradiso collection. Gurhan, a native of Turkey, enjoys working in pure gold, contrary to jewelry-making preferences of many of his contemporaries. He has

ignored the common belief that pure gold is too soft, heavy and expensive for jewelry, and by studying the techniques of ancient goldsmiths of the Anatolian and Byzantine empires, he has created his own signature technique. Gurhan has even been commissioned to create a collection for the Metropolitan Museum

The one-of-a-kind Paradiso all-around necklace in 24K gold features 19 mixedsized oval cabochon opals with rose-cut white diamond accents and creates a varied blue palette. The 16 - 17 inch adjustable length, 22K-gold chain has an extension and lobster clasp with one white-diamond accent. These stones can encircle your neck in exchange for \$49,920.
